A termite treatment plan involves drilling into your foundation and applying expensive chemicals, followed by annual renewal fees. If the insects have damaged structural beams, you are looking at major renovation work. A new

gutter system is the primary defense against creating the moist environment these pests crave. The cost of new gutters is a fraction of the cost of a structural pest remediation project.

Resale Value and Negotiation Credits

If you plan to sell your home eventually, deferred maintenance will come back to haunt you. A home inspector will flag old, failing gutters immediately. In a real estate transaction, buyers typically overestimate the cost of repairs.
